- DUI's exploded in the month of November, most likely due to the holidays.
- Most of the DUI's are from the 26-45 age groups.
- Minor consumptions are down most likely because of the joint efforts and other community groups providing education to make informed and healthy decisions.
- Also, RBST training has had an impact on overserving at establishments. More people are drinking at home rather than at local establishments.
- No further reported incidents at the park or public complaints. By being visible, the Drug Task Force has been instrumental in cleaning up the park in removing an individual that was contributing to the problem.
- The Drug Task Force is working on some very active cases at the moment.

	<p><u>New Opioid Guidelines</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • New guidelines for opioids prescribed in Minnesota were presented by Brent Thompson. • A few years ago, Minnesota Legislature passed an action stating that an opioid prescribing workgroup and creates guidelines. The Minnesota Hospital Association, Minnesota Department of Health and the workgroup are going to put the proposed guidelines into action. Basically if prescribers and pharmacists don't follow the guidelines their ability to take care of Minnesota care patients (Medicaid anyone under the care of Minnesota) will be taken away. • If the prescriber or pharmacist is found to be out of compliance, they will be asked to create an action plan to correct the situation. <p><u>New School Resource Officer</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There will be a new School Resource Officer will be hired for both Mora and Ogilvie School District. The officer will provide safety, security and connection with you to make positive choices. • The officer will have an office at both schools in order to provide a safe and private space for meetings. • KCSO will be meeting with the schools to develop a plan. • During the summer months the officer will stay in touch with the schools and Kanabec County Family Services to start a mentorship. • The Resource Officer will be attending the SACK meetings. <p><u>D.A.R.E.</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There has been interest within the school district to start the updated D.A.R.E. program
<p>OWN-IT Student Group Presentation</p>	<p>Three students from OWN-IT attend the SACK meeting to talk about their participation of the recent We Day celebration. On November 8, 2017, thousands of change-makers packed the Xcel Energy Center for an unparalleled event. World-renowned speakers, A-list performers, and tens of thousands of youth celebrated a year of action that transformed communities and changed lives.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This year the students focused on helping provide clean water to undeveloped communities. • There were 24 students and 5 chaperones attended the We Day celebration. • The students were surprised when they arrived and found out they had received VIP seating and was recognized for their positive involvement in the community. • The topic was "Changing Gen Z to Gen We" was well liked. The idea of bringing more people to help a common cause. • Another slogan on posters was "From Me to We". Together we can do more. • The students loved all the speakers. • Students thought the speakers were really engaging and enjoyed sitting in the front row. • The spot light and recognition and standing ovation for their random acts of kindness were really amazing. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Focus of the grant will fund an awareness grant. • On May 12th there will be a free community event regarding fetal alcohol syndrome. • It is walk/roll/run 4.9K. • There will be quiz stations to answer questions regarding fetal alcohol. A ticket will be given for correct answer for prize drawings. • There will also be an inspirational speaker with a personal story. • Volunteers are needed. <p>Recruitment Campaign</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This year’s recruitment challenge is GAS UP & GO! Bring in a new recruitment to win gas cards and car. There will be a race at the end for a grand prize. • There will be new “Join Us” pamphlets to use for recruitment and will be available to members soon. • Pastor Marlin and Patti Miller will be speaking to the Kanabec County Ministerial Association regarding recruitment. • There was also discussion for members to approach other community groups for recruitment, i.e., dentists, counselors, nursing homes, etc. <p>Epi/Data Group Information</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Patti Miller provided an Epi/Data Group Information binder to Brent Thompson, who will review the binder in order to organize a workgroup. • There was discussion to start a group meeting.
